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SPRING HEARING TIPS

To keep your ears healthy this season.

Springtime is a much-awaited season for those tired of the cold weather. However, it comes with its own set of risks despite its beauty. As the temperature rises, people tend to go outdoors for spring activities without considering the risks to their hearing health as the seasons change.


Exposure to loud sounds from lawn-mowers and chainsaws or environmental hazards like strong winds and water can pose severe threats to hearing health if appropriate precautions are not taken. To help you fully participate in spring activities while protecting your hearing, we have prepared a helpful guide outlining the four most common hearing health risks and tips to make the most of the season.

Loud outdoor activities

Now that the weather is nice, you might work in the shop or the yard. Many tools and equipment, such as lawnmowers, chainsaws, drills, and more, can harm one's hearing. Proper protection for your vision and hearing is essential when operating any machine.

Long-term exposure to many of these sounds can cause noise-induced hearing loss and in many cases, permenent hearing loss.

Wear well-fit earplugs and remove hearing aids when working with these tools and machines.



Prolonged water exposure

Have you ever experienced Swimmer's Ear? It is caused by prolonged water exposure that traps liquid inside your ears, leading to an infection that can cause symptoms like ear pain or muffled hearing. Preventing this condition is essential, and you can do so by practicing good hygiene after getting your ears wet. Tilt your head to one side and dry your ears with a clean towel. You can also wear earplugs when swimming or engaging in water activities.

If you wear hearing aids, removing them before swimming or protecting your ears with a hat or headband during rain is best. After use, lay your hearing aids out to dry or use a hearing aid dryer. Earplugs can prevent water from entering your ears, but they are not always practical. Remember to remove them after swimming and let your ears dry to prevent infections from developing.:

Seasonal allergies

As part of its protective function against threats, histamine can cause an increase in mucus production. This excess mucus can accumulate in the middle ear, obstructing the passage of sound waves to the inner

ear's hearing center. The build-up of fluid in the Eustachian tube may also cause pressure and a sensation of clogged ears, similar to when you experience changes in altitude, such as when flying.

Thankfully, antihistamines, such as Allegra, Claritin, and Zyrtec, can help reduce the symptoms caused by allergies, including those correlated to hearing.

The severity of allergy symptoms and excess fluid accumulating in the ear may increase the risk of developing an ear infection. Untreated ear infections can cause conductive hearing loss and have long-term effects on your hearing.

Hearing aid spring-cleaning

Spring is a perfect time to clean your hearing aids. Dirt, debris, and earwax can accumulate on hearing aids over time, causing issues like reduced sound quality and discomfort. To clean your hearing aids, wipe them down with a soft, dry cloth and use a specialized cleaning tool or brush to remove dirt or wax buildup. Have your hearing aids professionally cleaned and serviced at least once a year. Protecting your hearing health is crucial, especially in the spring.

IMPROVED CONVERSATIONS *IN RESTAURANTS* WITH **HEARING AIDS**

Restaurants can be very noisy, with sounds coming from all directions. There's the background noise of diners talking, the clatter of dishes and glasses, and often loud music playing overhead as people move around and chairs scrape against the floor. Even the chef's sounds may be audible, especially in trendy open-kitchen restaurants where noise can spill into

If you have hearing loss or wear hearing aids, dining in a lively restaurant can make hearing more challenging. If you are prepared, you can expect seamless conversations with those around you. Here are a few tips to help you navigate the noise.

Select the restaurant

dining areas.

If you're doing the planning, try to pick a quiet restaurant rather than a noisy corner bar and grill.

Select a restaurant with low ceilings and a kitchen that is out of view to patrons. High booths are another excellent feature for cutting down echo effects and improving acoustics to lessen disruptions.

Be sure to look at the online reviews. Many places implement noise ratings, ambiance, and lighting in their reviews. These are great for those affected by lighting or noise.

Sitting in the proper position

Sitting outside the restaurant rather than the center will help eliminate background noise. Furthermore, if you can sit in a booth rather than chairs, the booths can soften some of the echo and reverberance in the restaurant.

Here are a few seating options to keep in mind:

- Avoid sitting by the kitchen, as it is generally the loudest area of the restaurant. By sitting outside, you avoid the middle of the restaurant, which can have people on all sides of you.
- Sit with your back to as much noise as possible, facing the person you speak to. This will help you focus on what they are saying and the directional mics in your hearing aids to focus on their voice.

Consider an assistive listening device

If you have severe to profound hearing loss, it's essential to know that hearing aids may not always be enough in large group meetings where multiple speakers need to be heard, especially in noisy restaurants.







However, an assistive listening device could be a game-changer for you. Its receiver can amplify sound to a loop around the listener's neck. The microphone can be placed in the center of the table or used by whoever is speaking. Rest assured, a hearing specialist can help you determine whether this device works with your hearing aids or is appropriate for your needs.

Check your hearing aids before you leave

Most hearing aids that use disposable batteries will warn you when the battery is running low. Therefore, it is recommended that you keep at least one spare battery with you at all times to prevent being disconnected from communication. On the other hand, if your hearing aids are rechargeable, it is essential to charge them according to the manufacturer's instructions to ensure they work correctly.

Finally, don't worry.

Eating out can be a stressful experience for individuals wearing hearing aids. However, it's important to remember that whoever you're dining with likely wants to be heard as much as you want to listen. Staying calm will help you stay focused and take the necessary steps to improve your hearing ability. Take a deep breath, smile, and advocate for yourself. Be honest and prepared, and most importantly, enjoy the food.


EMPLOYEE SPOTLIGHT




Tell us a little about you:

Dinner Tonight! Hello, healthy! These wraps make creative use of collard greens and are loaded with rotisserie chicken, a rainbow of vegetables, yummy peanut sauce

Thai Chicken Wraps

Makes: 6 Servings Total Time: 30 mins

Ingredients

- 1/3 cup creamy peanut butter
- ¼ cup warm water
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 1 ½ tablespoons lime juice
- 1 tablespoon packed brown sugar
- 1 tablespoon chili garlic sauce
- 1 ½ cups shredded rotisserie chicken
- 8 large collard green leaves
- 1 ½ cups shredded carrot
- 1 ½ cups shredded red cabbage
- 1 cup red bell pepper strips
- 1 medium avocado, cut into 16 slices

 ¼ cup chopped fresh cilantro or sliced green onions

*Tip

Fresh collard greens can be sandy, so wash them well by dunking in cold water and swishing them around. Give them a good shake and pat dry.

Directions

Step 1:

For sauce stir together peanut butter, water, soy sauce, lime juice, brown sugar and chili garlic sauce. Combine chicken with half of the sauce.

Step 2:

Wash collard greens well;* cut off bottom stems. Place leaves shiny sides down; using a peeler, shave center veins even with leaves. Place 2 leaves on a paper towel; microwave 30 seconds. Repeat.

Step 3:

To fill, place leaves shiny side up with center veins running horizontally. Place one-eighth each of the chicken and remaining ingredients along each vein. Fold in sides and roll tightly. Cut in half; serve with remaining sauce.
